A message from Pastor Steve

Dear missionaries and friends of St. Paul's,

Do you want to know what is better than the pastor's article in the newsletter? When the pastor's wife Michelle writes it!! Enjoy Michelle's info and reflections on some of our new work coming up at and through St. Paul's:

"As you've heard by now St. Paul's is working with **Journey's End** to house a family at the Olin House, (St. Pauls parsonage). Journey's End Refugee Services, Inc. is a Christian community-based organization with the mission of welcoming refugees without regard to ethnic origin or creed and to assist them to become healthy, independent, contributing members of the community. The refugee resettlement program works to provide refugees with the resources and support they need to become successful, active and contributing members of the Western New York Community. There are several different terms used to describe refugees and we wanted to take a moment to clarify their meanings.

Refugee: A person who is outside their country of origin for reasons of feared persecution, conflict, or violence and require international protection. Refugees are given protection under international laws and agencies.

Immigrant: Someone who leaves his/her home and moves to a foreign country with intention of settling there.

Asylum seeker: Someone who is seeking international protection from dangers in their home country, but whose claim for refugee status hasn't been determined legally.

"Parolee" Status: Someone who is not eligible to enter the U.S as a refugee or immigrant may be "paroled" into the US by the Secretary of Homeland Security for emergency, humanitarian and public interest reasons.

As of now we are uncertain what the specific circumstances of the family will be. But regardless of their legal status, they are resettling into WNY and our job is to help support them. We want St. Paul's to be a welcoming community to them. We ask that you consider how you would like your family to be welcomed into a new and unfamiliar community - small things like smiles, greetings, gifts of food, invitations without expectations can all go a long way towards making others feel welcome."

Well said Michelle! Thanks to all of you who have worked so hard to position St. Paul's to help this family. And thanks to all of you who are about to join in the mission as well!

Report from the Church Council

It should come as no surprise to members of St. Paul's that we're very busy around here! For example, this past weekend we had the Peniel church Saturday morning, a memorial service Saturday afternoon, an adult lecture program Sunday morning, a very well attended regular service followed by a similarly well attended lecture series and finally, the Ray of Hope congregation services. During the week the building is in near constant use by the many organizations using our facilities (Tiger's Den Food Pantry, Family Support Center, Daily Bread Food Truck, Burrito Project, AA to name a few). We're now poised to accept and embrace a refugee family for resettlement in the Olin House in partnership with Westminster Presbyterian Church and Journey's End Refugee Service.

What is the role of the Council in all this action? Many of St. Paul's pursuits are geared to further our mission statement of "reaching beyond ourselves". But there is also the internal management of St. Paul's affairs to consider. To effectively execute both internal and external requirements, we require an infrastructure to manage the business of our St. Paul's organization. This is the responsibility of the Council along with Pastor Biegner and his Lead Action Team.

Progress is being made on several fronts. We've hired a Facilities Manager to serve as the single point of contact for users of our facilities. We have an Auxiliary Kitchen for use by the congregation and tenants. The Olin House has been made ready for occupation by a refugee family. Council is assessing our existing committees in relation to their function and membership within our current environment. But there is more to do. I plan to use this column to summarize the ongoing activities of the Council to keep readers of this newsletter informed and aware of our work.

St. Paul's Resettlement Mission

So much has been happening in the last month! The team has been working diligently to prepare the Olin House for rental. Through our partnership with Westminster Presbyterian Church (WPC) and Journey's End we're prepared to accept our first family for resettlement. As a reminder, Westminster is the official sponsor of the family through Journey's End Resettlement Services (JERS) and St. Paul's is the rental agent for the property (the Olin House). A family has been identified for resettlement through this arrangement. They are from Syria and include two parents and eight children ranging in age from 21 to 6½. They'll be moving into the Olin House on April 30th, 2022.

FAQs

Do we have more details about the family? The family name is Al Ali. Their native language is Arabic. The father is 47 years old and speaks some English. The mother is 45 years old and speaks very little to no English. We don't know if the children speak any English.

How can we communicate with them? If you don't speak Arabic, you can load the free Google translator application to your phone and use it to assist in communicating with the family. Under settings select offline translation.

What can we contribute to the new household? The WPC team will be handling the on-boarding requirements and will advise us if additional supplies, furniture, clothing, food, etc. are required. **Please do not drop off any items at this time. We will provide more information in the weeks ahead.** The family will be using **Tiger's Den** and a Food & Staple Item list is being developed to help meet their specific needs.

How can we learn more about the Syrian culture? Journey's End has a series of webinars. Check their website at www.jersbuffalo.org.

The month of May is a month of celebration, appreciation, and reflection.

May 1st & 2nd begins with the religious festival *Eid al-Fitr*, or the "Festival of Breaking the Fast," one of two major holidays celebrated by Muslims around the world. Eid al-Fitr commemorates the end of the fasting month of Ramadan. Experiencing hunger and thirst is supposed to heighten people's awareness of the sufferings of the poor, and gain a greater appreciation for what they have.

*May 5*th is **Cinco de Mayo**- An annual celebration of the anniversary of Mexico's victory over the French Empire at the Battle of Puebla in 1862. Cinco de Mayo is more widely celebrated in the United States than in Mexico. During the 1960's, Chicano activists looked for ways to honor their history and culture thus parades, parties, mariachi music, folk dancing, traditional foods such as tacos and mole poblano were introduced and became fan favorites.

May 30th, Memorial Day- Let us use this day to stop and reflect by remembering and thanking the millions of Americans in the United States military, who gave their lives for this country and the remarkable sacrifices they made!

We always have a lot of fun making the burritos together in the kitchen at St. Pauls and then taking them downtown to the bus station.



Bicycles for Refugees

Wheels for Workers 716 is a new non-profit, supporting Buffalo's large number of re-settling families. Our community partners include Casella Waste Systems, GoBike, Hello Buffalo!, Slow Spokes Buffalo, Stone Bench Consulting, West Herr, WNY Rotary Clubs, and Journey's End Refugee Services.

Our mission is to provide bicycles to WNY people and/or families who wish to work, but lack basic transportation. Biking and our hometown have been good to us, so we've decided to pay it forward by providing bikes and helmets to Buffalo's newest residents.

We exist through the generosity of the time, talent, and treasure of our community.

What we do:

WW716 collects unused bikes and bike parts, provides necessary repairs and servicing to make them functional, and coordinates their distribution to needy families.

How it works:

- WW716 collects bikes at St. Paul's Lutheran Church, 4007 Main St, Buffalo, NY 14226 (Look for the blue bike that marks the driveway on Main Street, just east of Eggert Rd. The bike racks are in back!). Drop off anytime, at your convenience!
- Our volunteer mechanics provide necessary service and repairs, restoring bikes to ride-able condition.
- Journey's End Refugee Services connects us to our new neighbors, linking ride-ready bikes to work-ready Buffalonians.
