Pastoral Message

On the early side of the possible start dates, Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on February 18th! And with all that's going on in the world, we need some good news.

So this year our theme is: "Tell Me Something Good!"

Lent was originally a season for new converts to learn and prepare for their baptism on Easter. During that time, they would study what was central to Christianity. So in Lent this year, we want to focus on what was central to Jesus' life and ministry: radical welcome, love for neighbor, care for the vulnerable, nourishment for the hungry, nonviolence in the face of injustice. At the heart of Jesus' teachings, we find liberation, love, mercy, and grace—all of which are meant to be very good news for us all.

Jesus' words are easily distorted and sanitized in our modern world. Following Jesus leads to a richer, more expansive life, but it's not necessarily comfortable.

Jesus' ministry can be described as "radical" which comes from the Latin word "radicalis," meaning "root" or "ground." Therefore, the good news should bring us back to our roots. Emulating Jesus and embodying his teachings should ground us in who God created us to be. Can we be "good news" people in a world too often burdened by bad news?

This Lent, let us remember that the good news really is good news. It is joyful—like fine wine saved for celebration. It grows like a mustard seed and smells like perfume poured from an alabaster jar. It tastes like bread passed endlessly through a hungry crowd. It sounds like laughter and feels like mercy. The good news is alive in the world.

We hope this Lenten time will provide fertile ground for conversation and worship, rooting our hearts and lives in the expansive goodness of God. This Lent, let the teachings of Jesus lead us forward. May the good news inspire us to take action in a world desperate to hear, see, and taste what is good.

Exciting Building Update

St. Paul's Ministry Expansion Update for February:

We, as God's church, are called to *reach beyond ourselves* with the good news of Jesus Christ. But how does an almost 200-year old church do that in a historic district... on the edge of a city... in a digital age... in a culture of church decline.

Simple: we create more space for God to work to feed those in need, build relationships with our community, create new opportunities for conversations and make more room for different worship experiences.

OK, maybe not that simple. But definitely doable!

Our current needs for our community and church are fourfold:

- 1.) More afternoon/evening space and opportunities for people who are battling food insecurity to get support and also build relationships with others so they know they are not alone on this journey.
- 2.) New space in Eggertsville where people can come together in the mornings for conversation, coffee and connection to others that live in the neighborhood.
- 3.) Sunday morning space where we can come early and stay later to have deeper conversations and give one another support over coffee and food.
- 4.) New space to have a non-traditional worship experience for people that are uncomfortable going to traditional church.

So what should we call this?

Let's step back to get a better idea.

Exciting Building Update (continued)

In 1832, just five years after St. Paul's was founded, Christian Eggert (yes, the guy from the Ville name) built a home on the corner of Main and Eggert (where the plaza is now). Starting in the 1850's, the structure served as the local tavern, the neighborhood inn, the post office, the butcher shop and local store. It was torn down in 1960. But for over 100 years, it was the place where Eggertsville gathered, came together, and shared life. It was called: the Eggertsville House.

After praying through this with our leadership and consulting attorneys to capture the name, we would like to reclaim that name for this neighborhood and through the four points above, recreate **The Eggertsville House** at 4007 Main St in between our sanctuary and Olin House.

Brunners has the Tavern covered. We're doing housing through the Kahle and Olin Houses, but this new Eggertsville House will allow us to reach more deeply into this end of Amherst with God's good news, food for the hungry, relationships for the lonely, direction for those lost and hopefully be the place where Eggertsville gathers.

Here's a couple updates on the process:

- A.) The congregation will have to vote in late spring before we can make everything official.
- B.) The architect is putting more plans together and putting the concept out to bid so we can come to the church with a fairly sound cost.
- C.) The Town of Amherst is in process of approving the addition with some plan modifications that are being worked out. In fact, you may see updates in the minutes of the Town Planning Board meetings.
- D.) In the weeks ahead, we will ask you to be a part of several teams: Communications (internal); Marketing (external); Exterior design; Interior design; Programming/Daily Bread expansion. We hope that when asked, you'll consider serving on one of these important short-term teams.

We'll have more updates in the days, weeks and months ahead on the exciting plans for The Eggertsville House. But if you have questions, please email Council or pastors so we can answer those for you.

Simple right? Maybe not. But doable! So let's *reach beyond ourselves*.

Steven was a graduate of Buffalo State University, a graduate of Amherst High School and an accomplished businessman in our community. He was also a former member of Saint Paul's. As a young boy, he attended Sunday School. He, along with his brother Mark really enjoyed the classes lead by a great man named Bruce Mitchell. Steven always said Mr. Mitchell made Sunday School interesting and fun! He also attended Religious Instruction, Confirmation Classes on Monday evenings, was confirmed and served as an Acolyte at Sunday services.

Throughout his life, Steven's kindness seemed to flow naturally. He gave his time, his strength and his heart to everyone around him, never asking for anything in return. Helping others was simply who he was and who his spirit remains.

On quiet mornings, or long afternoons when he was a teen, he could be seen cutting the lawn at Saint Paul's, caring for God's house the same way he cared for people. As time went on, if a friend's car wouldn't start, he would be there fixing it with grease on his hands and a smile on his face. If someone's home needed repair or remodeling, he would happily show up ready to work, offering skill, patience and encouragement.

Steven was always a loving son, a protective and supportive brother, a cherished grandson, nephew, cousin, and a playful caring uncle.

His family and friends knew his love not just through words, but through countless acts of service, showing up, caring and giving without condition. What made Steven truly special was not what he did, but rather how he did it. He helped quietly, humbly, and wholeheartedly.

His kindness left an impression on lives, not because he sought recognition, but because he believed in doing good, simply because it was right. It came naturally to him.

Steven's passing on Christmas Day 2010 will always bring a lingering of profound sadness. However, we are also reminded of the message that the birth and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ brings, that is one of Hope, Salvation and Eternal Life.


Isaiah 25:8

Transition Team at Amherst Update

At the writing of this article, the transition team has met twice. We are working to make the move from two campuses to one as smooth as possible for the St. Paul's community as a whole. We'll be communicating each month through a few bullet points about the building, logistics, and future plans.

“Sending of Items” We are identifying items that have been donated by specific families or given in honor of a specific person and reaching out to them. We are also assigning different items to each month so we can say a prayer of thanksgiving in worship as we decommission pieces. In January, we said thanks for our green hymnals, and in February we will be sending some of the hanging-stained glass to beautify the walls at Hospice and Roswell.

Inventory – We've begun taking a good look through the building to take inventory of what is in the building that belongs to St. Paul's and what belongs to various renters. We will assign a storage room for each group so we can designate belongings.

We Need!

A photographer – we'd like to have the sanctuary stained glass photographed well so that we can create something that would hang at Eggertsville.

A seamstress – we want to use the paraments at Amherst to make a few hanging banners for the sanctuary balcony at Eggertsville.

Last Worship at the Amherst Campus – May 16, 2026. After looking at the timeline and the needs around building, and praying together, the team has decided that May 16th will be our last Saturday worship at the Amherst Campus.

Future Services – The transition team has begun praying about and talking through what a future second service would look like. There is still a need for a second service, and one that is different from the traditional Sunday morning. We have begun brainstorming a few ideas but will be working on getting congregational input before plans are finalized. We will be taking a break over the summer so we can launch the new service effectively. There will be an evening service offering again.







News about the Al Shohani family in Olin House.

The Al-Shohani family has been renting Olin House for 4 months now, and they are very grateful for the support they receive from members of St. Paul's congregation.

The family has been adjusting to cold weather and icy winter conditions. At the end of December, mainly through the efforts of Cheryl Gillen, we were able to provide family members with new winter parkas. Cheryl used some donations to the holiday Angel Tree and found coats on sale. The Al-Shohani family recognizes Christmas and they have a small, silver, decorated tree in the living room.

The mother, Neamat, works every weekend in the ST. Paul's kitchen and helps to prepare meals for the Monday meal share. She is able to bring dinners home to the family as well as food items from the Wegmans gleaning program.

News from the Alali family in Lockport:

The oldest daughter, Amani, was married on December 6, and this was a huge celebration. Her husband, Walid, came to the US with his parents and siblings around the same time as the Alali family. Their mothers met while attending programs at Journeys End Resettlement Services. 


